

GFirst LEP Business Group Update: March 2018



- The Advanced Engineering and Manufacturing Business Group held a lively informative meeting with a wide range of presentations on 12 March.
- Geraldine McCullagh from the University of Gloucestershire provided details of the Gloucestershire
 Accelerated Impact Network Support [GAINS] programme supported by the European Regional
 Development Fund. The programme is aimed at SMEs and includes subsidised access to approved
 business coaches to take businesses to the next level. Contact: gmccullagh@glos.ac.uk.
- Brian Fowler from Gloucestershire College spoke about the opportunities and success of the College
 in addressing apprenticeships. In a recent Ofsted inspection they had achieved an Outstanding for
 winning apprenticeships. Since 2010 they had delivered to 33k apprentices across 1200 different
 programmes from level 2 through to degree level. Nationally apprenticeships had decreased by 60%

- Kathrin Beckerleg said that this year's **Festomane** event on 8 March with the theme *Fall in Love with Engineering* was held at the Growth Hub. It had been a massive success with overwhelming numbers in the target age range of 14 18. Agri Food & Rural Business

- The Agri Food and Rural held an interesting meeting at Hartpury College on 16 March. The Chairwoman, Jo Price, Vice Chancellor, spoke to the group about her recent attendance at a meeting of all the LEP Business group Chairs. She had found it very interesting to hear what the other groups have been involved with and the journeys they were on. All had agreed that the meeting of these Chairs was very useful, so the group will meet at least twice a year in future. Jo had also met with a newly formed female farmers group, GALS Gloucestershire Agriculture Ladies Society. They are very much a fledgling group and JP was impressed with their enthusiasm and willingness to learn and hoped to nurture a closer association.
- A discussion was held on the need to complete a clear strategy for the group possibly aligned to
 the themes and strategic recommendations in the key findings contained in the 2017 SW Rural
 Productivity Commission report. The group suggested 6 core objectives as a basis for this. These
 were circulated to all group members for further consideration at the next meeting,
- Janet Dwyer from the University of Gloucestershire provided a most informative update on the
 work she was currently doing on the businesses producing Food and Drink in the county. 148 had
 already been identified excluding tourism already listed. It was agreed that it was paramount
 that this LEP group could demonstrate the importance of the rural economy within the county.
 We could use the information as evidence during MP's discussions.
- Bob Watters gave a really useful update on the following initiatives:

- At their last meeting the group was provided with a very interesting update on the Cheltenham Cyber Park project by the project manager, Jeremy Williamson. Funding of £22m is being provided toward the initial infrastructure costs by GFirst LEP through Growth Deal 3. He highlighted potential issues including a possible 18 traffic modelling scenarios alone. The aim is however to get first site occupation by early 2021.
- Geraldine McCullagh also gave an interesting presentation on Gloucestershire's Accelerated Impact
 Network Support [GAINS]. As part of this package SME's in the county can access 40% of the cost of 4

Construction & Infrastructure

- At their meeting on 28 March the C&I Group was addressed by Pete Bungard CEO of Gloucestershire County Council. He spoke about the Gloucestershire 2050 Vision being led by Leadership Gloucestershire and the University of Gloucestershire and the vision that currently contains six "big ideas" articulated at https://glos2050.com/default.asp. This sparked a lively, informative and useful debate.
- An update on "Consideration of Barriers to Development" paper prepared by the C&I Group was provided. Annette Roberts from Tewkesbury Borough Council [TBC] is Chairwoman of the sub group formed to suggest actions arising. There was consensus about the huge and welcome progress that had been made in improving the relationship between businesses and the local Districts in understanding each other's problems in this area.
- Annette is pulling a seminar together of all the key stakeholders in both the public and private sector to address the issues the sub group had identified from the report. The date of the seminar is to be confirmed but will be either the 8 or 10 May.
- The group expressed their concerns about the proposed allocation of the 192ha of employment land agreed by the JCS in relation to the proposed Cheltenham Plan. They agreed to respond to the Cheltenham Plan proposals as part of the current consultation period. This expires on 9 April.

Energy

- A meeting was held at Ecotricty, Stroud on 27 February.
- Dave Evans from Schneider gave an interesting presentation providing a fascinating look into the
 future of innovative work being done on renewable energy projects and how these could provide a
 more efficient product to the consumer ultimately at a reduced cost.
- Funding has been received from BEIS to procure an Energy Strategy from externals based on the
 proposal put together by the sub group led by Pete Wiggins. A procurement exercise inviting tenders
 are on www.supplyingthesouthwest.org.uk. using the Glos County Council protocols.
- BEIS have allocated £2.7m nationally from their Capacity support fund to fund the creation of 5 Local Regional Energy Hubs across the country. Gloucestershire are in the SW Region along with 6 other LEPs: Swindon & Wilts, Solent, Heart of SW, Dorset, Cornwall/Isles of Scilly and West of England. The West of England Combined Authority [WECA] and LEP will host the Hub and 4 staff in Bristol. Details of the key objectives and tasks are being worked on.

- A meeting was held on 21 February at the Cheltenham Campus of Gloucestershire College.
- Jason Smith Marketing Gloucester gave the group an update on the UK Digital Retail Innovation Centre [DRIC] that will be opening up in the Eastgate Shopping centre. This will address such innovative technology such as 3D virtual reality. It was acknowledged that current retailers were woefully unprepared for the digital age. There was excitement that some very big players within the UK are very interested in this project. There had even been interest from as far afield as the USA. It is hoped that the DRIC will open in June 2018.
- Polly Barnfield provided an update on the #WDYT campaign. 37% of all retail sales are influenced by digital, by 2020 that figure will go up to 49%! Huge difference between shoppers and retailers. Over 81% of shoppers will use multiple devices to research what they want to buy, but over 90% of retailers can't connect. Feedback has been extremely positive to date, particularly from the current pilot in the Brewery. The Meadows Shopping Centre has recently started trials.
